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## Introduction

A flood involves an overflowing of a large amount of water onto areas of dry land. Floods can have positive effects such as relieving drought prone areas but also negative effects such as costing millions of dollars of damage to buildings and infrastructure. This flood bibliography is the third in a series of information bibliographies presenting material held in the NOAA Libraries on natural disasters. Here you will find scientific studies and recounting of flood events from the earliest times to the present.

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Some interesting items in this collection:

A report from 1844 titled: "Report of a Committee of the Delaware County Institute of Science on the great rain storm and flood, which occurred in that county on the fifth of August, 1843: with a map of the county" which discusses a flood event, which occurred in that county on the fifth of August, 1843 (*Held in the Rare Book Collection of the NOAA Central Library in Silver Spring, Maryland*)

A book from 1889 titled: "History of the Johnstown flood: including all the fearful record, the breaking of the South Fork dam, the sweeping out of the Conemaugh Valley, the overthrow of Johnstown, the massing of the wreck at the railroad bridge, escapes, rescues, searches for survivors and the dead, relief organizations, stupendous charities, etc., etc.: with full accounts also of the destruction on the Susquehanna and Juniata Rivers, and the Bald Eagle Creek." (*Held in the Rare Book Collection of the NOAA Central Library in Silver Spring, Maryland*)

A book from 1904 titled: "The floods of the spring of 1903, in the Mississippi watershed." (*Held at the NOAA Miami Regional Library*)

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
